

WHITE COUNTY BOARD MEETING

JUNE 8, 2015

9:00 A.M.

A special meeting of the White County Board begun and holden this 8<sup>th</sup> June, 2015 in the Courtroom of the White County Courthouse in the City of Carmi. Chairman Trout called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

Clerk Dozier called the roll with Doshier, Usery, Puckett and Trout all present. Mike Ray recorded as absent.

Chairman Trout asked the board if they had received minutes of the previous meeting and were there any additions, changes or deletions. Mr. Usery made a motion that the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be waived and that the minutes of the previous meeting be approved as proposed in writing. Mr. Doshier seconded the motion. Motion carried 4-0-1 on roll call vote with Ray recorded as absent.

Chairman Trout asked for a motion to approve payment of all current bills. Mr. Usery made a motion to pay all current bills, seconded by Puckett. Motion passed 4-0-1 on roll call vote with Ray recorded as absent.

Mr. David Doshier, member of the White County Board stated that on the behalf of Pamela Armstrong, White County Treasurer, that they were talking and the Investment Policy that was previously adopted by the Board has a change that the ethics portion was left out when rewritten and it needs to be reinserted and reviewed by the Board and voted on at the next month's meeting.

Mr. Puckett stated that the next 9-1-1 meeting would be held on June 20<sup>th</sup> at 6:00 p.m.

Mrs. Sara Hon, presented the annual report for the TB Board. She had o active cases of TB for the last fiscal year with one positive reactor. The individual does not have the disease and cannot spread it, but they did have a positive skin test and it was a pretty typical case.

Chairman Trout stated that the first item on the agenda was to award and execute contract documents for Section 12-02-125-00-BR a Carmi Township Bridge Project located at Brownsville. Mr. Brian Ray, White County Engineer, stated that this was a bridge located at 1100N and is located on the Carmi and Heralds Prairie Township line. Mr. Ray stated that they had 3 bids with Dees Incorporated out of West Frankfort, Illinois being the lowest bid at \$133,749.00. Mr. Usery made a motion to award and execute the contracts on that Carmi Township Bridge Project, seconded by Puckett. Motion carried 4-0-1 on roll call vote with Ray recorded as absent.

Chairman Trout stated that the next item on the agenda is to consolidate the precincts from 27 to 18 precincts. Chairman Trout explained that the Board was merging Enfield 4 and 5, merging Indian Creek Precinct #7 into Indian Creek 6 & 8, merging Burnt Prairie 9 & 10, Carmi 15 & 16, Carmi 17 & 18,

Heralds Prairie 22 & 23, Gray 24 & 25, Phillips 26 & 27 and Emma 29 & 30. Mr. Denton Aud, States Attorney, brought up the issue of the number of people that are allowed within a precinct and Mr. Doshier stated that it was looked into and there was not going to be an issue with the division. Mr. Puckett asked if there was any research down on how much it would save the county with the consolidation and Mr. Doshier stated that he did some looking into it and he came up with a figure of roughly \$9000.00. This is not including the cost of Election Judges pay and mileage. Mr. Doshier wishes that Mill Shoals could have been consolidated as well but understands. The resolution reads as follows:

#### RESOLUTION RE-ESTABLISHING ELECTION PRECINCTS IN WHITE COUNTY, ILLINOIS

WHEREAS, pursuant to 10 ILCS 5/ 11-2 of the Illinois Compiled Statutes, the County Board of White County, Illinois, is required to establish election precincts for said county as therein provided.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the County Board of White County, Illinois, that from and after the effective date of this Resolution, election precincts in White County, Illinois shall be as follows:

MILL SHOALS PRECINCT NO. 1 – (POLLING PLACE LOCATED IN THE MILL SHOALS TOWN HALL ON EAST STREET, MILL SHOALS)

ALL OF SECTIONS 19 THROUGH 36 IN TOWNSHIP 3 SOUTH RANGE 8 EAST IN MILL SHOALS TOWNSHIP

MILL SHOALS PRECINCT NO. 2 – (POLLING PLACE LOCATED IN THE VILLAGE OF SPRINGERTON TOWN HALL ON SOUTH MAIN STREET, SPRINGERTON)

ALL OF SECTIONS 1 THROUGH 36 IN TOWNSHIP 4 SOUTH RANGE 8E IN MILL SHOALS TOWNSHIP

ENFIELD PRECINCT 4 (POLLING PLACE LOCATED IN THE ENFIELD TOWNSHIP HALL, 208 EAST MAIN STREET, ENFIELD)

ALL OF ENFIELD TOWNSHIP (MERGING PRECINCT 4 & 5)

INDIAN CREEK PRECINCT NO. 6 – (POLLING PLACE LOCATED IN INDIAN CREEK TOWNSHIP BUILDING, 113 S. DIVISION STREET, NORRIS CITY)

Beginning at the NE Corner of the NE Quarter of Section 1 Township 6 South Range 8E (where the West side of County Road 600E intersects with County Road 1100N); thence West along the South side of the centerline of County Road 1100N until you intersect with the East side of the centerline U S Highway 45; thence South along the East side of the center line of U S Highway 45 until it intersects with Illinois

Highway 1 (U S Highway 45 will change into Division Street once inside the Village of Norris City limits); thence South along the East side of the center line of Illinois Route 1 until it intersect with County Road 250E; thence South along the East side of the center line of 250E until it intersects with 500N; thence East on the North side of the center line of 500 N until it intersects with Illinois Highway 1; thence South on the East side of the center line of Illinois Highway 1 until it intersects with County Road 450N; thence East on the North side of the center line of County Road 450N to County Road 600E; thence North on the West side of the center line of County Road 600E (which is also the Indian Creek Township Section line) to the place of beginning.

INDIAN CREEK PRECINCT NO. 8 – (POLLING PLACE LOCATED IN INDIAN CREEK TOWNSHIP BUILDING, 113 S. DIVISION STREET, NORRIS CITY)

Beginning at the NW corner of the NW Quarter of Section 6 Township 6 South Range 8 East; thence East along the South side of the Section line until it intersects West side of the center line U S Highway 45; thence South along the West side of the center line of U S Highway 45 ( US Highway 45 will change into Division Street once in the Village of Norris City limits) until it intersects with Illinois Highway 1; thence South along the West side of the center line of Illinois Route 1 until it intersects with county Road 250E; thence South along the West side of the center line until it intersects with County Road 500N; thence East on the South Side of County Road 500N until it intersects with Illinois Highway 1; thence South on the West side of Illinois Highway 1 until it intersects with County Road 450 N; thence East on the South side of the center line of County Road 450N until it intersects with County Road 600E ( the Indian Creek Township line); thence South on the West side of County Road 600E (Indian Creek Township Section line) until the intersection of Illinois Highway 141: thence West on the North side of Illinois Highway 141 and/or Indian Creek Township line until you intersect with the west side of the Indian Creek Township line; thence North along the east side of the Indian Creek Township line or until it turns into County Road 00E to the place of beginning.

BURNT PRAIRIE PRECINCT 10 (POLLING PLACE LOCATED AT THE BURNT PRAIRIE COMMUNITY BUILDING 431 MAIN STREET, BURNT PRAIRIE)

ALL OF BURNT PRAIRIE TOWNSHIP (MERGING BURNT PRAIRIE 9 & 10)

CARMI PRECINCT NO. 12 (POLLING PLACE LOCATED AT THE NEW BEGINNINGS CHURCH COMMUNITY ROOM, 401 SYCAMORE STREET, CARMI)

Beginning at a point where the South side of 1700N and County Road 1100E (Centerville Blacktop) intersects the South line of Burnt Prairie Township: then South along west side of the center line of County Road 1100E (Centerville Blacktop) to West of the center line of Third Street; thence North to the intersection of Third and Shipley Street in Carmi: thence West along the North side of the center line of

ShIPLEY Street to Sixth Street; thence South along the West side of the center line of Sixth Street to Sycamore Street; thence West along the North side of the center line of Sycamore Street to Illinois Street thence South along West side of the center line Illinois Street ; thence West along the North side of the center line Stewart Street Road to James Avenue; thence North along East side of the center line of James Avenue to Sycamore Street (or Cemetery Road) thence West along the North Side of the centerline of Sycamore Street to north side of the center line of 1475N; thence North on the East side of the center line of County Road 900E; thence West along the North side of the center line of 1500N; thence North along the East Side of 850; thence west along the north side of the center line of 1560N; thence North on the East Side of the center line of 800 East ; thence West on the North side of the centerline of 1600N; thence North on the Enfield Township Section line until it intersects with County Road 1700N thence East along the South side of the center line on 1700N until it intersects with 1100E at the place of the beginning.

CARMI PRECINCT NO. 13 (POLLING PLACE LOCATED AT THE FLORAL HALL ON THE FAIRGROUND, 201 FAIRGROUND ROAD, CARMI)

Beginning at the intersection of Sycamore Street ( Cemetery Road ) and James Avenue in Carmi, Illinois; thence south along the West side of the center line of James Avenue to Stewart Street or (old Enfield Road); thence East along the South side of the center line of Stewart Street to Burrell Street; thence south along the West side of the centerline of Burrell Street to the Norfolk Southern Railway right of way ; thence Northeast along the Norfolk Southern Railway right of way to Twelfth Street; thence South on the West side of the center line of Twelfth Street to Oak Street; thence Northeast along the Southeast side of the centerline of Oak Street to Ninth Street; thence Southeast along the Southwest of the centerline of Ninth Street to Main Street; thence Southwest along Main Street and Illinois Route 1(which will be northwest of the Center line of Main and/or Route 1) to a point where said Illinois Route 1 intersects Heralds Prairie Township line at County Road 1100N; thence West along the North side of the centerline of County Road 1100N to County 600E; thence North along the East Side of the centerline of County Road 600E; thence East on the South side of the centerline on County Road 1600N; thence South along the West side of the centerline on County Road 800E; thence Southeasterly along the Southwesterly side of the centerline of 1560N; thence South along the west side of the centerline of County Road 850E; thence East along the South side of 1500N; thence South along the West side of the center line of 900E; thence East along the South side of the centerline of 1475N to the place of beginning.

Beginning at the intersection of Sycamore Street and Sixth Street in Carmi, Illinois; thence South along East side of the center line of Sixth Street to the Railroad right-of-way; thence West along said railroad right of way to Burrell Street; thence North along the East side of the centerline of Burrell Street to Stewart Street Road; thence East along the South side of Stewart Street Road to Illinois Street; thence North along the east side of the center line of Illinois Street to Sycamore Street; thence East along the south side of the centerline of Sycamore Street to the place of beginning.

CARMI PRECINCT 16 (POLLING PLACE LOCATED AT THE NEW BEGINNINGS CHURCH COMMUNITY ROOM, 401 SYCAMORE STREET, CARMI)

Beginning at the intersection of Third Street and Shipley Street in Carmi, Illinois, thence South along the West side of the centerline of Third Street to Main Street; thence Southwesterly on the Northwesterly side of the centerline to Ninth Street; thence North along East side of the centerline of Ninth Street to Oak Street; thence West along the North side of the centerline of Oak Street to Twelfth Street; thence North along the East side of the centerline of Twelfth Street to the railroad right of way (old Norfolk Southern Railroad); thence West along the railroad right-of way to Burrell Street; thence North along the East side of the center line Burrell Street to the Evansville Western Railway right of way); thence East along the South side of the Railroad right-of way to Sixth Street; thence North down the East side of the center line of Sixth Street to Shipley; thence East down the South side of the center line of Shipley Street to the place of beginning. (MERGED CARMI PRECINCTS 15 AND 16)

CARMI PRECINCT 18 (POLLING PLACE LOCATED AT THE FLORAL HALL ON THE FAIRGROUND, 201 FAIRGROUND ROAD, CARMI)

Beginning at a point where County Road 1100E (Centerville Blacktop) road crosses the South Boundary of Burnt Prairie Township; thence East along South side of County Road 1700N; thence South along the West side of the centerline of County Road 1200E (which is also the Hawthorne Township Section line) to the West side of the Evansville Western Railway right of way (Hawthorne Township Section Line); thence South to the Carmi City limits; thence West following the Carmi City limits across the Little Wabash River; thence South still following the City limits and then West to Church Street Road; thence North along the East side of the center line Church Street; thence West along the North side of the center line on Webb Street; thence North on the East Side of the center line Plum Street to Main Street; thence East along the South Side of Main Street to Third Street; thence North on the East side of the center line of Third Street to County Road 1100E; thence the East Side of the center line of County Road 1100 E to the point of beginning. (MERGED CARMI PRECINCT 17 & 18)

CARMI PRECINCT 19 (POLLING PLACE LOCATED AT THE FLORAL HALL ON THE FAIRGROUND, 201 FAIRGROUND ROAD, CARMI)

Beginning at point where the South city limits of Carmi, Illinois, intersects the West boundary of Hawthorne Township; thence South along the West boundary of Hawthorne Township to the Southeast corner of Section 24 Township 5 South Range 9 East of the 3<sup>rd</sup> P.M. in White County, Illinois; thence West to the Southwest corner of Section 24; thence North to Main Street (Illinois Route 1); thence East along the South side of the center line on Main Street (Illinois Route #1) to Plum Street in Carmi; thence South along the West side of the center line of Plum Street to Webb Street; thence East along the South side of the center line on Webb Street to Church Street; thence south along Church Street to the South City limits of Carmi, Illinois; thence East along the south city limits of Carmi, to the place of beginning.

CARMI PRECINCT #20 (POLLING PLACE LOCATED AT THE FLORAL HALL ON THE FAIRGROUND, 201 FAIRGROUND ROAD, CARMI)

Beginning at the Southeast corner of Section 24 Township 5 South Range 9 East of the 3<sup>rd</sup> P.M. in White County, Illinois; thence South along the East boundary of Carmi Township to the Southeast corner of Carmi Township; thence West along the South boundary of Carmi Township to Illinois Route #1; thence Northeast along Illinois Route 1 to College Boulevard in Carmi; thence south along the west side of College Blvd. to the Southwest corner of Section 24, Township 5 South Range 9 East of the 3<sup>rd</sup> P.M. in White County, Illinois; thence East to place of beginning.

HERALDS PRAIRIE PRECINCT 22 - (POLLING PLACE LOCATED IN THE HERALDS PRAIRIE TOWNSHIP COMMUNITY BUILDING, 1049 COUNTY ROAD 600N NORRIS CITY)

Mr. Doshier made a motion to consolidate precincts, seconded by Usery. Motion carried 4-0-1 on roll call vote with Ray recorded as absent.

Chairman Trout stated that the next item on the agenda was to adopt the Prevailing Wage Ordinance. Chairman Trout stated that this is an annual resolution that action must be taken in the June meeting. The resolution is as follows:

**ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING PREVAILING WAGE**  
**FOR THE COUNTY OF WHITE, STATE OF ILLINOIS**

**Whereas,** The State of Illinois has enacted “an Act regulating wages of laborers, mechanics and other workman employed in any public works by the State, County, City or any public body or any political subdivision or any anyone under contract for public works,” approved June 26, 1941, as amended, being Section 39s-1 through 39s-12, Chapter 48, Illinois Revised Statutes as amended by Public Acts 86-799 and 86-693 and,

**Whereas,** the aforesaid Act requires that the County of White, State of Illinois, investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in said Act for laborers, mechanics and other workmen in the locality of said County of White, State of Illinois, employed in performing construction of public works for said County of White, State of Illinois.

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CHAIRMAN AND COUNTY  
BOARD OF THE COUNTY OF WHITE, STATE OF ILLINOIS:**

**Section 1:** To the extent and as requested an act regulating the wages of Laborers, mechanics and other workmen employed in any public works by the State, County, City or any public body or any political subdivision or by anyone under contract for public works,” approved June 26, 1941, as amended, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workmen engaged in the construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of this County of White, State of Illinois, is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in the White County area as determined by the County Board of the County of White, State of Illinois, as of June 9, 2014, a copy of the determination being attached hereto as “Exhibit A” and incorporated herein by reference. The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance, which are also used in the aforesaid Act shall be the same as in said Act.

**Section 2:** Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of the County of White, State of Illinois, to the extent required by the aforesaid Act.

**Section 3:** The White County Clerk shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party in the Office of the County Clerk, White County Courthouse, Carmi, Illinois, this determination of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications.

**Section 4:** The County Clerk shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer; and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed, or file their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rate and the particular class of workmen whose wages will be effected by such rates.

**Section 5:** The White County Clerk shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois.

**Section 6:** The White County Clerk shall cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within White County, and such publication shall constitute Notice that the determination of prevailing rate is effective and that this is the determination of prevailing wage of this public body.

WHITE COUNTY

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

CERAMIC TILE FINISHER, MARBLE FINISHER, TERRAZZO FINISHER

Assisting, helping or supporting the tile, marble and terrazzo mechanic by performing their historic and traditional work assignments required to complete the proper installation of the work covered by said crafts. The term "Ceramic" is used for naming the classification only, and is in no a limitation of the product handled. Ceramic takes into consideration most hard tiles.

ELECTRIC POWER LINEMAN

Construction, maintenance and dismantling of overhead and underground electric power lines, including high voltage pipe type cable work, and associated structures and equipment.

ELECTRIC POWER EQUIPMENT OPERATOR - CLASS 1

Operation of all crawler type equipment D-4 and larger from the ground to assist the Electric Power Linemen in performing their duties.

ELECTRIC POWER EQUIPMENT OPERATORS - CLASS 2

Operation of all other equipment from the ground to assist the Electric Power Linemen in performing their duties.

ELECTRIC POWER GROUNDMAN

Applies to workers who assist the Electric Power Lineman from the ground.

ELECTRONIC SYSTEMS TECHNICIAN

Installation, service and maintenance of low-voltage systems which utilizes the transmission and/or transference of voice, sound, vision, or digital for commercial, education, security and entertainment purposes for the following: TV monitoring and surveillance, background/foreground music, intercom and telephone interconnect, field programming, inventory control systems, microwave transmission, multi-media, multiplex, radio page, school, intercom and sound burglar alarms and low voltage master clock systems.

Excluded from this classification are energy management systems, life safety systems, supervisory controls and data acquisition systems not intrinsic with the above listed systems, fire alarm systems, nurse call systems and raceways exceeding fifteen feet in length.

SURVEY WORKER - Operated survey equipment including data collectors, G.P.S. and robotic instruments, as well as conventional levels and transits.

TRUCK DRIVER - BUILDING, HEAVY AND HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

Class 1. Drivers on 2 axle trucks hauling less than 9 ton. Air compressor and welding machines and brooms, including those pulled by separate units, truck driver helpers, warehouse employees, mechanic helpers, greasers and tiremen, pickup trucks when hauling materials, tools, or workers to and from and on-the-job site, and fork lifts up to 6,000 lb. capacity.

Class 2. Two or three axle trucks hauling more than 9 ton but hauling

less than 16 ton. A-frame winch trucks, hydrolift trucks, vector trucks or similar equipment when used for transportation purposes. Fork lifts over 6,000 lb. capacity, winch trucks, four axle combination units, and ticket writers.

Class 3. Two, three or four axle trucks hauling 16 ton or more. Drivers on water pulls, articulated dump trucks, mechanics and working forepersons, and dispatchers. Five axle or more combination units.

Class 4. Low Boy and Oil Distributors.

Class 5. Drivers who require special protective clothing while employed on hazardous waste work.

#### OPERATING ENGINEERS - BUILDING, HEAVY AND HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

Class 1. APSCO or Equal Spreading Machine, Backhoe, Backfiller, Boom or Winch Cat, Bituminous Mixplane Machine, Blacksmith, Bituminous Surfacing Machine, Bull-Dozer, Crane, Shovel, Dragline, Truck Crane, Pile Driver, Concrete Breaker, Concrete or Pumpcrete Pumps, Dinky or Standard Locomotives, Well or Caisson Drills, Elevating Grader, Fork Lifts, Flexplane, Gradeall, Hi-Lift Hoists, Guy-Derricks, Hysters, Mechanic Motor Patrol, Mixers-21 cu. ft. or over, Push Cats, Pulls and Scrapers, Two Well Point Pumps, Pulverizer or Tiller, PugMill, Rubber-Tired Farm Type Tractor with Bulldozer/Blade/Auger or hi-lift over 1/2 yd., Jersey Spreader, Tract-Air used with Drill or Hi-Lift, Trenching or Ditching Machines, Wood Chipper w/Tractor, Self-Propelled Roller w/Blade, Equipment Greaser, Self-Propelled Bump Grinder on Concrete pavement, Boat Operator, Skid-Loaders, Tuggers, Lazer Screed, and Self-Propelled Chip Spreader (when others run conveyors).

Class 2. Any type tractor pulling any type roller or disc, Two Air Compressors (220 cu. ft. capacity or over), Two AirTract Drills, Air-Track Drill w/Compressor, Automatic Bins or Scales w/Compressor or Generator, Pipeline Boring Machine, Bulk Cement Plant w/Separate Compressor, Power Operated Bull Float, Hydra-Lift w/Single Motor, Straw Mulcher Blower w/Spout, Self-Propelled Roller/Compactor, Back-End man on Bituminous Surfacing Machine, oiler on milling machine.

Class 3. Air Compressor w/Valve driving piling, Boom or Winch Type Truck, Two Conveyors, Self-Propelled Concrete Saw, Form Grader, Truck Crane Oiler, Self-Propelled Vibrator, Rubber Tired Farm Type Tractor w/Blade/Bulldozer/Auger/hi-lift - 1/2 yd. or less, Elevator Operator, Man Lift (scissor lift) when lifting materials.

Class 4. Air-Track Drill (one), Belt Drag Machine, Power Broom, Mechanical Plasterer Applicator, Trac-Air, Air Compressor (220 cu. ft. or over) One, Air Compressor (under 220 cu. ft) four, Automatic Bin, Bulk Cement Plant w/Built-in Compressor running off same motor or electric motor, Fireman or Switchman, Self-Propelled Form Tamper, Light Plants (4), Welding Machines (4), Pumps (4), or Combination of four (4) Pumps, Light Plants, Welding Machines, Air-Compressors (under 220 cu. ft.), Mudjacks or Wood Chipper, Mixers - less than 21 cu. ft. Mortar Mixer w/Skip or Pump, Pipeline Tract Jack. One Operating Engineer may operate and maintain any combination of the following pieces of equipment, not to exceed four (4) which shall be within a reasonable distance, such combination may include any equipment in this classification: (Compressors, Light Plants, Generators, Welding Machines, Pumps or Conveyors), One Well-Point Pump, Two Motor Driven Heaters, One Air Compressor (under 220 cu. ft.), One Engine-Driven Conveyor, One Motor Driven Heater, One Light Plant, One Pump, One Welding Machine, One Ulmac or Equal Spreader, Oilers, and one Generator 10 kw or greater.

OPERATING ENGINEER RIVER WORK 1 - operate the following machines when working on River Work and Levee Work on the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers, Lakes and Tributaries: Crane, Shovel, Drageline, Scrapers, Dredge, Derrick, Pile-Driver, Push Boat, all power boat operators, Mechanic, Engineman on Dredge, Leverman on Dredge, All Bituminous Spreader machines, Backhoe, Backfiller, Boom, or Winch Cat, Bituminous Mixplane Machine, Blacksmith, Bituminous Surfacing Machine, Bulldozer, Truck Cranes, Hydraulic Truck Mounted Boom/Crane, Concrete Finishing Machine, or Spreader Machine, Concrete Breaker, Concrete or Pumpcrete Machines, Concrete Plant Operator, All Off Road Material Hauling Equipment, Dinky or Standard Locomotives, Well Drill, Elevating Grader, Fork-Lifts, Flexplane, Gradeall, Hi-Lift, Power Handblade Tugger type Hoist, Hoist Two Drum (or over one), GUYDERRICK, Hyster, Motor Patrol, Mixers - 21 Cu. Ft. or over, Push Cat, Pulls, & Scrapers, Pumps-Two Well Points, Equipment Greaser, P & H Pulverizer or Pulverizer equal to Pugmill, Pugmill, Rubber-Tired farm type tractor w/Bulldozer/Blade/Auger or Hi-Lift over 1/2 yard, Skimmer Scoops, Seaman Tiller, Jersey Spreader, Tract-Air used with Drill or Hi-Lift, Trenching or Ditching Machine, Wood Chipper w/Tractor, self-propelled roller w/Blade, Concrete Pumps and Small Equipment Operators.

OPERATING ENGINEER RIVER 2 - when working on River Work and Levee Work on the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers, Lakes and Tributaries shall be employed as the Oiler or Fireman on Crane, Dragline, Shovel, Dredge, Truck Crane, Pile Driver, Gradeall, Dinky or Standard Locomotive, Guy Derrick, Trenching Machine or Ditching Machine 80 H.P. and over, All

Terrain (cherry-picker) with over 40 ton Lifting Capacity, Deck Oiler and Deckhands.

Other Classifications of Work:

For definitions of classifications not otherwise set out, the Department generally has on file such definitions which are available. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task, the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

Mr. Doshier made a motion to approve the Prevailing Wage Ordinance, seconded by Puckett. Motion carried 4-0-1 on roll call vote with Ray recorded as absent.

Chairman Trout stated that the next item on the agenda was to consider increasing the rate paid for mileage from .225 cents per mile to the amount allowable by the Internal Revenue Service. The current rate is .575 cents per mile and it should be made effective to January 1, 2015. Chairman Trout stated that he thinks it is something that needs to be done even though it will be costly. Mr. Doshier made a motion to increase the rate the County pays for mileage to the rate allowed by the Internal Revenue Service effective as of January 1, 2015. Motion seconded by Utery. Motion carried 5-0 on roll call vote.

Chairman Trout asked Kelly Fulkerson, Circuit Clerk, to present the resolution to increase juror pay. Mrs. Fulkerson went on to explain that effective on June 1, 2015 in a civil trial you are only allowed 6 jurors now whereas, it use to be 12. She stated that for a criminal trial there will still be 12 jurors. The statue has now changed stating that it is no longer allowing alternate jurors and that the defendant will have to pay for the alternates if wanted. Mrs. Fulkerson that the fee for alternate jurors that is to be stated by the county to be at the cost of \$150.00 per alternate juror to be paid for by the litigant. Mrs. Fulkerson stated that she has been talking to other Counties and they are going to follow suit. The resolution is as follows:

The Illinois Legislature amended the Code of Civil Procedure (Public Act 98-1132), effective June 1, 2015, whereby all civil jury cases shall be tried by a jury of 6 instead of 12.

WHEREAS, said amendment further provides that if Alternate jurors are requested, an additional fee, established by the county, shall be assessed for each alternate juror requested.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Code of Civil Procedure, 735 ILCS 5/2-1105, as amended, the Circuit Clerk presently assesses and collects from the requesting litigant a fee for civil jury trial demands; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the County Board of the County of White, that the Clerk of the Circuit Court of White County is hereby authorized and directed to assess and collect a fee of \$212.50 for a civil jury trial demand and \$150.00 for each alternate juror, said fee shall be collected from the requesting party in each civil case within which a jury trial demand is made as provided in 705 ILCS 105/27.1a(s).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the County of White that the effective date of this Resolution shall be June 9, 2015.

(Text of Section after amendment by P.A. 98-1132)

Sec. 2-1105. Jury demand.

(a) A plaintiff desirous of a trial by jury must file a demand therefor with the clerk at the time the action is commenced. A defendant desirous of a trial by jury must file a demand therefor not later than the filing of his or her answer. Otherwise, the party waives a jury. If an action is filed seeking equitable relief and the court thereafter determines that one or more of the parties is or are entitled to a trial by jury, the plaintiff, within 3 days from the entry of such order by the court, or the defendant, within 6 days from the entry of such order by the court, may file his or her demand for trial by jury with the clerk of the court. If the plaintiff files a jury demand and thereafter waives a jury, any defendant and, in the case of multiple defendants, if the defendant who filed a jury demand thereafter

waives a jury, any other defendant shall be granted a jury trial upon demand therefor made promptly after being advised of the waiver and upon payment of the proper fees, if any, to the clerk.

(b) All jury cases shall be tried by a jury of 6. If alternate jurors are requested, an additional fee established by the county shall be charged for each alternate juror requested. For all cases filed prior to the effective date of this amendatory Act of the 98th General Assembly, if a party has paid for a jury of 12, that party may demand a jury of 12 upon proof of payment. (Source: P.A. 98-1132, eff. 6-1-15.)

Mr. Doshier made a motion to increase additional fees for alternate or additional jurors. Motion seconded by Puckett. Motion passed 4-0-1 on roll call vote with Ray recorded as absent.

Chairman Trout asked for a motion to accept the resignation of Donald Allen to the Egyptian Health Department Board. Mr. Puckett stated that he knew Mr. Allen and that he has not been on the board long. Mr. Puckett made a motion to accept the vacancy of Donald Allen. Motion seconded by Usery. Motion passed 4-0-1 on roll call vote with Ray recorded as absent.

Chairman Trout asked filling the vacancy of the Egyptian Health Department be tabled until the July meeting. Mr. Puckett made the motion to table the replacement of Donald Allen to the Egyptian Health Department Board until July meeting. Motion seconded by Usery. Motion passed 4-0-1 on roll call vote with Ray recorded as absent.

Chairman Trout stated that the next item on the agenda was to consider appointing him to the 9-1-1 Emergency Telephone System Board for a four year term. Chairman Trout stated that this is actually a Board appointed position and is only a 2 year term. Mr. Puckett was happy to have him on the Board with his experience in tele communications. Mr. Doshier made a motion to appoint Wes Trout to a two year term on the Emergency Telephone System Board, seconded by Usery. Motion carried 4-0-1 on roll call with Ray recorded as absent.

Chairman Trout asked the Board to consider the appointment of Matt Lamont to the Southeastern Illinois Economic Development Authority Board. Chairman Trout stated that this was something that has been around for years and what the Board does is award grants to new businesses and works in conjunction with Greater Wabash Regional Development Committee. Chairman Trout stated that Mr. Lamont is familiar with this job and has done work in a similar setting. Mr. Usery made the motion to appoint Matt Lamont to the Southeastern Illinois Economic Development Authority Board, seconded by Puckett. Motion passed 4-0-1 on roll call vote with Ray recorded as absent.

Chairman Trout stated that the Blue Cross/Blue Shield renewal rate would increase from \$646.70 to \$706.35 for the \$2,500 deductible policy and from \$709.81 to \$770.05 for \$1,000.00 deductible policy. The policy will renew on August 1, 2015. Chairman Trout stated that the new policy was at 13% but the County's agent was able to get it down to 8% and that was good down percentage. Mr. Puckett asked if it was a yearly increase and Chairman Trout told him that last year the percentage increase was smaller but it did happen yearly. Chairman Trout

stated that there are two different policies that are offered to the employees. Mr. Puckett made the motion to accept the renewal rate increase from \$646.70 to \$706.35 for the \$2,500 deductible policy and from \$709.81 to \$770.05 for the \$1,000 deductible policy. Motion was seconded by Usery. Motion passed 4-0-1 on roll call vote with Ray recorded as absent.

Chairman Trout stated that the next meeting would be Tuesday, July 14, 2015 at 7:00 p.m.

Mr. Usery made a motion to adjourn. Motion seconded by Puckett. Motion carried 4-0-1 on roll call vote with Ray recorded as absent.
